Alliance Touchstones for Collaboration

- 1. Be present as fully as possible. Speak our truth from our hearts and minds.

- 4. When the going gets tough, suspend judgment and get curious. Be quick to forgive and ask open questions to understand.
- 5. Honor each other's learning and resourcefulness. Trust we each will learn and contribute in our own way, that there is no need to "fix" each other.
- 6. Make space to pause and reflect to deepen our thinking.
- 7. Be willing to have meaningful conflict to create unprecedented goals and solutions. When needed, seek counsel for help with conflicts.
- 8. Allow our ideas to be developed further by others.
- 9. Seek common ground. When we can't fully agree, we commit to seeing what happens from a humble posture of learning, reaching a decision we can all live with.
- 10. Accept that we will sometimes fail, but will learn together and move forward, also known as failing forward.
- 11. Help each other to have the confidence to spread our wings, be creative, and take on new roles.
- 12. Balance our yearning for change with patience for the process of change and growth.
- 13. Make the way we work together be an example of what's possible.







What is Data Equity?

The term 'data equity' ... refers to **the consideration**, **through an equity lens**, **of the ways in which data is collected**, **analyzed**, **interpreted**, **and distributed**" (Lee-Ibarra, 2021)

Data equity is a **set of principles and practices** to guide anyone who works with data through every step of a project through the lens **of justice**, **equity**, **and inclusivity**" (Data.org)








Data Equity Framework

A Need for Data Equity Conversations

People want and deserve to share their thoughts and feelings

Power Re-balance

Communities each have unique sociocultural, political, and economic factors

Data Sovereignty

Data-related issues:

- Communities were/are forced to rely on other people to explain what data means
- "Helicopter Effect"
- Focus on deficiencies rather than strengths



Prior work on Data Equity within The Alliance



Regional Data Scan Findings

Reduce existing data-related inequities

- Urban/rural differences and inequities
- Demographic inequities
- Peer-to-peer support platform (demystifying data collection/use)
- Center communities in prevention-related conversations to identify what they want and need for their own efforts
- Support the use of alternative sources/types of data for decision-making and fulfillment of grant requirements

Increase data collection and availability



Faith-based orgs

areas)

- School and student-related data
- Local and regional levels
- Capacity to collect usable data for rural communities and smaller grant-funded orgs

Reduce the burden of prevention work



- Aid in building shared regional efforts while avoiding uncoordinated duplication of efforts or redundancies
- Promote cross-regional mentorship
- Support policies and actions that move activities and services from crisis to prevention



Regional Data Scan Findings

"If you are at a table, look around and if there is no one from the group you are trying to help, then you are not doing the work right."



Communities feel "overwhelmed by data" and there is a need to build local meaning and connection.

"Make data collection a two-way street for raising awareness."

"More quality work is happening in villages where we can connect with everyone."

"There is so much crisis here, it's tough to focus on prevention."
